# **Leaving Certificate Applied Social Education Tasks**


The 6 Leaving Cert Applied class had a very busy term up to Christmas doing their Social Education Tasks. These tasks are part of their Leaving



Certificate. Each student chooses a contemporary issues topic to research and investigate and carry out an action project to raise awareness on their chosen topic.

The girls chose topics such as Mental Health, STI's, Homelessness, Prison Life, Drug Addiction, Cancer Awareness and Domestic Violence. Lots of desk and field research was carried out in the computer room and analysing questionnaires, surveys, interviews from the school community and the wider community. Once the research was carried out the students decided on their action projects to raise awareness of their topics.

The class did a range of actions from posters, information leaflets, teaching the class about their topic,

# Fifth Year Ifunanya Ogochukwu publishes novel for teens

It's not every day a School Library gets to host a published author, so it was an especially huge deal when this author was our own fifth year student Ifunanya Ogochukwu. Some of us had heard snippets of Ifunanya's writing before – she has been reading stories and small excerpts from her story to the school's Creative Writing group for two years – but nobody had seen or heard the finished piece, a novel for young people which she self-published this summer. It's called *The Source*, it's about two young people, their memories gone, with special powers and a hidden past. And it's brilliant!! Ifunanya may only be fifteen years old, there is no doubt that she is a writer.

The Library was dark this lunchtime and students were spread out, as per social distancing rules. The event – billed as a Book Reading, but serving as the launch of Ifunanya's debut novel – was a ticketed event. Students had applied for tickets via email, and the lucky attendees sat two metres apart at desks around the study hall. The event was run by an efficient team of Library Prefects, who looked after the guest list, the room layout and hygiene, the staging, media and electronics, as well as art and promotion.

As Ifunanya sat at the front of the Library on 3rd December, students from all years waited for her reading to start. Her parents and sister sat in the front row as guests of honour, and School Principal Ms Cameron introduced her with a speech congratulating Ifunanya and encouraging those around to see her as an inspiration.

Before Ifunanya started reading, a short film began to play on the screen above her head. She had created this herself, as a trailer for The Source. When it finished, and after a small battle with a faulty microphone, she was introduced by the Librarian and opened her book to read.

Ifunanya read on for ten minutes. At the end of the first chapter, she had time for a few questions before students returned to class.

### When did you start writing The Source?

"I started writing this book about five years ago.
That was in fifth class, when I was ten. It actually started out as a short story. There was a competition in school that we had every year – a short story competition. I entered this [The Source] but it was shorter. So, yeah, I won that [laughs]. That's how it started."

## What is the hardest part of writing a book?

"The hardest part is to keep motivated, because som days you look at your work and you are like "wow, this is a masterpiece!" and then other days you kind of looked at it and you saw all the flaws and you couldn't look at anything else. There are



other days when I'm busy and I just couldn't write. And there are other days when I'm just too lazy, you know."

# Do you have any advice to offer anyone who loves writing and might be thinking about following in your footsteps?

"The best advice that I can give you is that you can't be a writer if you don't read. That's really big. I read a whole lot in primary school. I was the girl who would get out fourteen books in the library. Also, the second piece of advice is: you have to write. So, write often (but not too often if you're busy – just for practice). Say you're writing a long draft, it might be hard, because you want to make everything perfect. I'd say, just write ahead. You're going to be able to edit it at the end."

#### And finally, are you working on anything else?

"Well yes, this is actually the first book in a series. So there will be more."

We look forward to reading many more books from this talented young writer in the future. *The Source*, self-published by Ifunanya C. Ogochukwu N., is available directly from the author or via Amazon.

#### A Tribute to Margaret MacCurtain, OP

Margaret MacCurtain, OP – Sr Margaret, or 'Sister Ben' to many who knew her – died before Christmas in Santa Sabina House at the great age of 91. However, she was never old. She was always, as we would now say, ahead of the curve: a passionate social reformer, a great scholar, and a courageous advocate for the protection of children and the advancement of women.

Sister Ben never lost her radical instincts, but it was the warmth of her infectious personality and her generous sometimes mischievous spirit that won over a great many to her lifelong causes. More than any one she ensured that corporal punishment was banished from Irish schools, and more than any other professional historian she brought to light the hidden role of women in Irish history. She will be fondly remembered by the thousands who knew her in the Dominican Order, in UCD, and in Irish public life at large.

Deepest sympathies to her family and to the Dominican community who have lost such a wonderful friend.


Students and teachers gave book recommendations to their English teachers and the School Librarian. These were posted on Twitter and the school website.

# St Dominic's College Lockdown Hobbies and Pastimes

This time last year, our students were entering their first Lockdown. Home schooling was a novelty, expected to last a short time. Teachers, students and parents were slowly learning to adjust to this new reality. Hobbies had an air of novelty about them. Online schooling was finding its feet.

Teenagers experienced a summer holiday like no other. They might not have met up with any friends or cousins. Booked holidays and other plans may have been cancelled. That delicious feeling of summer days just hanging out with friends — one we have all taken for granted over the years — evaporated, along with trips to the cinema, shopping centre, beach. And then, when they returned to school, they faced more difference. More rules to follow, one way systems, rivers of hand sanitiser, any hints of friendly smiles hidden behind face masks.

And yet, these young people remained resilient, even upbeat. Last term they took to our new system as though it had existed for years. They adapted to online and blended learning, new routes around the school. They borrowed more books from the School Library (using Click and Collect) than during the same period last year.

When we returned to online teaching and learning in January, our young people were ready. As online classes became routine and filled our students' days, it would be natural to assume they might be stuck for extracurricular activities outside of class times. While some lunch activities have been offered (here I'll make a plug for the Library's bi-weekly lunchtime clubs), these cannot make up for in-person activities.

Student activity was notable in the Virtual Library (a Google Classroom run by the School Librarian), and this cross-year group platform was used to pose a question to students early in the term. 'What are your Lockdown hobbies and pastimes?' Students did not disappoint in the range of answers they provided. 73 students responded altogether.

It was clear that family life was important to our respondents, with several talking about doing these activities with siblings or the whole family. Baking and family walks were particularly common.

TikTok was mentioned by a few dance fans (and this was sometimes a family activity too), and we had one gardener in our midst. There were a few family pets mentioned as getting extra attention during Lockdown, and someone even took up keeping pet shails! Languages were mentioned by a few, with several taking up a new language and some honing home language skills. Sewing, crossstitch, origami and photography were mentioned, as were board games and video games. There were some patterns across the board.

#### Exercise

38% enjoyed regular exercise, such as workouts, dance, yoga and walks with family

#### **Baking**

34% of respondents said baking or cooking was a significant Lockdown pastime

#### Reading

25% read regularly, some mentioning researching interests, others listening to audiobooks or reading manga

#### Art

18% mentioned painting, drawing or photography; there was also one digital artist

#### Music

14% talked about the opportunities they had to play and listen to more music during Lockdown Thank you to all respondents for taking part in this survey, and for giving us this glimpse into your Lockdown lives.



#### **Geography Trip**

As a part of the Leaving Certificate Geography class, the 6<sup>th</sup> years were required to examine a landscape and examine the effect of hydraulic action and elevation on a beach of a selected coastal area. We as a class, went on a field trip to Balscadden Bay located in Howth, to complete the required activities. This trip took place on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of September on a Tuesday. Many students met up in Dublin City Centre, then took the train from Connolly Station to Howth. The collection of students all gathered at Howth where they were met with other geography students who had made their way and the geography teachers by 8am. The weather was mild at Howth with some sunny spells and winds.

Once we reached the beach we were split into groups of sixes in order to complete every exercise efficiently while maintaining the COVID-19 guidelines and regulations made by the HSE at the time. We were met with another geography class group from a different school, to which we were assigned a particular region of the beach to ensure minimal contact. We carried out many activities which included: calculating wave frequency, examining the beach profile and recording the curvature of rocks to dictate the effects of erosion on the beach. All equipment's were wiped down with disinfectant wipes and students ensured to use a generous amount of hand sanitizer to ensure safety. By around 1:30pm we had completed our analysis and made our way back home.
