


Well done to our 5th year students Emily Harold and Hazel Byard Shaughnessy who represented Team Ireland at the Taekwondo European Championships last week.

We had 13 athletes in action at the above competition in Tullamore. First on track was Martha Fisher in the junior hurdles. Martha is new to this event but came 2nd in her heat and 3rd in the final. Aoibhinn Byrne came 2nd in the junior 1500, her twin Erin came 3rd in the junior 800, Aimee Ryan came 2nd in the final of the junior 200. The junior relay team of Aimee, Martha, Erin and Danielle won their heat and final.


SCIENCE /



The Leaving Cert Applied students have been very busy over the last few weeks.


5LCA had their task interview for the Vocational Preparation and Guidance, for this task the students organised a movie afternoon for first year students - it was a great success.

Le Chéile Conference: the student experience





Peer2Peer




Then they worked on a PowerPoint Presentation in order to teach the first year students about everything that they had learned. The teaching took place over the course of two weeks as there were six classes.


The first year students enjoyed the lessons greatly as they were informative but fun. They were able to teach the students plenty of valuable information.

Book Review – 1st & 2nd Year Extra English

Every week we do one hour of extra English which helps us with our Junior Cycle course.

Starting out we worked on what knowledge we already had from Primary School and revised adjectives, nouns, verbs and adverbs. We learned how to spot these in detailed examples of written work and how to spot errors in printed articles. We then wrote our own detailed pieces of work and kept them together in class folders. When this was finished, we read a little introduction to a novel, Black Beauty. We had heard about this book before and some of us had read it, but this was a different version. There are lots of versions but this one was handy as we could read two chapters and answer the questions based on the chapters during our class time.

The best part was when we did the chapter summary quizzes on the Chromebooks. We competed against each other before the time ran out – that was fun. The quiz questions were about the novel and it was good to help us to remember what we had read the previous week. When we completed reading the novel we did a book review sheet – we gave the book a star rating on the whiteboards in class. We also did some research ourselves and presented to the rest of the group what we found. Most of us liked the book and even though we didn't think it was that interesting to begin with, the more we read, the more we liked it. It was good to be able to take turns reading because everyone got to be heard. It was a bit distressing at times to learn how animals were treated in Victorian times but also relieving to see how times have changed for the better. We know that animals are still mistreated but not as much as they used to be. It is a great story overall. It shows us how animals are capable of human feelings and that if they are shown respect, then they will show respect to their owners. We learned a little bit about how important it is to care for animals and to be kind.

We learned about the importance of kindness in the story, about showing it and appreciating it being shown to us. We put all our work on display in our classroom and put the characters from the story in order under their profile pages. We would recommend this novel to anyone – there are so many different versions of it so everyone can find one that suits them and enjoy it in their own time.
